Meeting of Land of Sky Regional Council February 25, 2015

Minutes

- I. <u>Call to Order</u> George Goosmann called the meeting to order at 1:00pm.
- II. <u>Invocation</u> Charles Dickens gave the invocation.
- III. Pledge of Allegiance -
- IV. Roll Call Bob Davy called the roll. The following members were present: Miranda DeBruhl (primary), Denise Braine, Glen Englram, George Goosmann (primary), Jonathan Kanipe, Ryan Stone, Anne Coletta, Bob Davy, Barbara Volk, Dona Mennella, Lawrence Ponder, Gene Knoefel, Charles Dickens, Kathe Harris, John Mitchell, and Mark Burrows. The following guests were present: Roger Kumpf (Congressman McHenry's Representative), and Jeff Staudinger (City of Asheville). It was announced that a quorum was not present. New business items were addressed through Executive Committee action (attached).
- V. <u>Modification and Approval of Agenda</u> -
- VI. Public Comment -
- VII. <u>Recognition of Special Guests</u> Mr. Goosmann recognized Roger Kumpf with Congressman Patrick McHenry's Office.
- VIII. <u>Chairman's Comments and Roundtable</u> Mr. Goosmann recognized Vicki Jennings, Coordinator for the Senior Companion Program, who introduced LOSRC's new RSVP Coordinator, Anne Whisenhunt, recently from Charleston, SC where she performed much the same duties. LeeAnne Tucker introduced Nancy Smith-Hunnicutt, who has formerly worked as an Ombudsman for 14 years with LOSRC.

In the interest of getting the meeting done before the winter weather moved in Mr. Goosmann invited members to report on items of importance, or to pass. Justin Hembree reported that Gene Knoefel was appointed to serve as a representative to the Senior Tar Heel Legislature (STHL).

- IX. Approval of Minutes from the January Regular Meeting No action taken.
- X. <u>Consideration and Approval of Consent Agenda Items</u> No action taken.
 - A. January FY2015 Treasurer's Report
- XI. Presentations/Recognition -
 - A. <u>Kathleen Godwin Cole Award: Nominations Open</u> Ms. Jennings shared with the Council the history of the Kathleen Godwin Cole Award and the person behind that honor. A nomination form is included in the Council packet and those are due to the appropriate Aging staff by the end of March. LOSRC volunteers aged 55 and up are eligible to be nominated. The award presentation will take place during the Council meeting in April.
 - B. <u>Regional Housing Needs Assessment</u> Jeff Staudinger, Assistant Director, Community & Economic Development Department with the City of Asheville presented information regarding the 2014 Housing Needs Assessment. He shared that the assessment provides a very comprehensive report on the housing market needs of Asheville and the four-county LOSRC region. The City of Asheville as the

participating jurisdiction member of the Asheville Regional Housing Consortium contracted with Bowen National Research for a professional housing market study. The assessment establishes the top needs of the housing market and Mr. Staudinger shared that the results are on the City's website and copies will be distributed to the four-counties so they can provide the assessment results to their citizens. (Presentation included with miutes).

Mr. Staudinger shared how Council could find out more information and during subsequent disucssion, it was shared that all sites within the survey area currently under construction were included in the survey. Voluntary partnerships are being pursued with private sector developers to grow the affordable housing stock. During discussion regarding the needs that municipalities with less resources have around finding resources to do housing studies Mr. Staudinger stated his willingness to speak at public meetings. More information will be shared withy Council on ways to deal with the issue of having eough affordable housing.

- C. <u>Clean Cities: Building Partnerships to Cut Petroleum Use in Transportation</u> Technical difficulties were anounced with regards to showing the videos and that in the interest of moving quickly, this presentation would be re-scheduled for the March Council meeting.
- D. <u>LOSRC Audited FY2013/14 Financial Statements</u> Elizabeth Keel provided a overview of the agency's audited financial statements for FY2013/14. Ms. Keel noted that, as in past years, there were no audit "findings" and the organization's compliance with federal and state was adequate.

Mr. Goosmann shared that a copy of the audit will be emailed out to Council members. Mr. Hembree shared that Council can review the audited report at their leisure and direct questions/comments/concerns to the appropriate staff. He shared that LOSRC's ability to provide compliance with grant requriements is what the agency does which can be a much more comprehensive process that what municipalities usually have to go through and he shared his appreciation for the hard work done by Vickie Thomas, LOSRC's Finance Director.

XIV. Executive Director's Report -

- A. <u>S.W.O.T.</u> Analysis Mr. Hembree shared the results of the S.W.O.T. (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats) analysis conducted during the Leadership retreat. He shared that the next step will be to send out the survey to member governments, stakeholders, etc. to define weaknesses/strengths (which can be each at the same time). Results will be shared with Council as the strategic planning process proceeds.
- B. NC Tomorrow Summit Mr. Hembree directed Council's attention to the information regarding the NC Tomorrow 2015 Summit planned for April 27th and 28th. He stated his desire to get the information out to Council as this will primarily be a conference about economic and community development . The conference will offer a mix of government and private sector leaders that will offer best practices, case studies and skill-building workshops for attendees. Mr. Hembree shared with Council that the Summit will have plenary sessions divided up by urban issues and rural issues as the conference was developed for both urban and rural representatives. The NC Department of Commerce is partnering with the NC Association of Regional

Councils of Governments (NCRCOG) for the Summit and will provide information on CDBG grants and how to apply for those funds. Registration is currently open for the event.

- C. <u>Proposal to Eliminate EDA</u> Mr. Hembree shared that this issue comes up nearly every year in the US House of Representatives where legislation is introduced to eliminate the EDA. In our region, multiple projects have been accomplished with EDA funds (i.e. Craft Beer Project in LOSRC region). NADO has asked that our members of the House of Representatives be contacted to share concerns about the legislation, and to ask that they do not co-sponsor this legislation. Mr. Hembree shared that the challenge is to tell the stories of the positive impacts of these funds and he referred Council members to talking points provided by NADO. Mr. Hembree shared that there is local skin in the game with these funds and it's important for Representatives McHenry and Meadows to hear from regional leadership. If our voices are not heard, it will be a difficult case to make to not eliminate the EDA.
- D. Executive Committee/Officer Nominations Mr. Goosmann shared that the Executive Committee has discussed leaving the Officers as they stand for another year. Mr. Hembree shared that having Officers serve for two years would be a more optimal position for Council to be in- if the Officers were willing to serve- as there are many things coming up in the next year (the Strategic Plan; a planned, major re-write of the by-laws; transitions within the agency, etc.). Mr. Hembree shared that he will email out a report and he stated that the Executive Committee was willing to accept new members, and if there were folks that really wanted to serve, those names should be submitted for consideration. It was reiterated that Executive Committee meetings are open meetings and everyone is welcome to attend. No action needs to be taken on this now and more info will be provided prior to any decisions being made. Mr. Hembree concluded by sharing that the committee was not opposed to change.

Background: The North Carolina Department of Insurances' Seniors' Health Insurance

Information Program (SHIIP) intends to award the Council a grant of \$17,866 to increase enrollment of North Carolina Medicare beneficiaries with limited incomes and resources into the Low Income Subsidy and Medicare Savings Programs. Area Agencies on Aging will be key partners in providing outreach to people who are aging and/or who have mental or physical disabilities and

are eligible for Medicare.

SHIIP serves as the lead agency in the state to educate, counsel, and enroll beneficiaries in the Medicare Part D program. SHIIP counsels Medicare recipients on the various prescription drug plans and provides assistance in choosing a plan that fits an individual's needs. Presently – through SHIIP county coordinators, community volunteers, expert staff, and a statewide consumer hotline – SHIIP assists hundreds of senior citizens, their families, and other Medicare beneficiaries on a daily basis. Through the years, SHIIP has demonstrated a strong capacity to identify and partner with a variety of organizations and groups with the goal of fostering awareness about all aspects of Medicare and Medicare-related health insurance to the citizens of

North Carolina.

Background:

Since the early 2000's, Land of Sky Regional Council and NCDENR's Division of Environmental Assistance and Customer Service (DEACS) has had a partnership to operate the Waste Reduction Partners program. WRP utilizes staff and volunteer engineers and scientists to provide waste reduction, pollution prevention, and utility cost saving strategies to local governments, businesses, industries, non-profits, and other public institutions throughout North Carolina. DEACS provides a staff supervisor (state employee) to manage the Waste Reduction Partners' program at the LOSRC. The LOSRC administers the Waste Reduction Partners (WRP) program with DENR support funding and other leveraged contracts. The Waste Reduction Partners program has been highly successful - assisting more than 2,140 organizations that have saved more than \$70 million in utility operating expenses and improved environmental management strategies.

Over the next two years LOSRC proposes to continue this valuable partnership for LOSRC members and stakeholders with an application for continued operating support for the WRP program from NCDENR. LOSRC is requesting \$120,000 over two years to support the technical assistance services and administration of the program at Land of Sky. The term of the contract is proposed to be July 1, 2015 – June 30, 2017. No match is required. Terry Albrecht will continue to serve as the WRP Director.

Subject: USDA –Rural Energy for America Program: WRP Energy Audit Support

Background: Land of Sky Regional Council's Waste Reduction Partners program has been

providing energy efficiency audits to USDA defined small businesses and farms across North Carolina. The assessments help business reduce operating costs and also serve as an application requirement for energy project implementation grants provided by the USDA. Since 2012, Waste Reduction Partners has performed 40 on-site energy assessments to these small businesses, which produced \$366,400 of annual client energy cost savings, and eight of these

clients also received direct USDA project grant funding totaling \$122,655.

LOSRC is applying for support funding to continue this energy auditing assistance using its unique team of retired engineers. Waste Reduction Partners proposes to provide 35 energy audits to both rural small businesses and farms across all of North Carolina's qualifying rural counties with a USDA grant application of \$54,375. A 25 percent match will be provided though NCDENR support funding for the WRP partnership program. The proposed project timeline: October 1, 2015 through September 30, 2016. The WRP

technical team is uniquely qualified to deliver this cost-effective service.
